Survivor Spotlight – Jonathan Varner, Pine Orchard, AL

On March 4, 2010, at the age of 21, I was involved in a Motor Vehicle Accident in which I was ejected 50 ft. from my car on I-65 in Butler County. I had a severe brain injury. I spent three months at Baptist South and two weeks at Spain Rehabilitation before being discharged back home. When I was released from the hospital, I used a wheelchair, then a walker to get around and struggled with memory, processing, mood, socializing, mobility, and double vision. I had outpatient therapies at Baptist East and Alabama Orthopedics as well as numerous services through the ADRS. I now live with my wife and daughter and am back in the community working on hobbies I enjoy, including rodeo.

What helped me the most in my recovery path was the goal of being able to get back to the rodeo. I was world ranked in the Professional Cowboy Association (PCA) Rodeo circuit and rode bulls prior to my injury. After my accident, I was paralyzed on the right side of my body (lost the use of my right arm and leg) and used a wheelchair. I had a supportive family with my mom providing direct care. To help me walk again, we made many trips up and down our long driveway. As I did therapy, I always kept my rope with me and the ultimate goal of being able to return to the rodeo. I also was referred to Montgomery Area Non-Traditional Equestrians (MANE) for Therapeutic Horse Riding that provided the ramps to practice getting back on a horse. I was in a wheelchair and didn't have a horse ramp at my house to be able to ride my horses. Once I was able to get out of the wheelchair, I started to ride my own horses & began to get back into roping on a smaller scale.

Not being able to ride my horses was hard for me since the rodeo was such a big part of my life. I worked hard and struggled often with my new life's ups and downs. But now I can ride a horse and compete in team roping again, and I love it. The advice I have for others going through the same struggles as me is to never give up and never quit trying. When I left Montgomery, one of the doctors told me I would never be able to do rodeo again and I proved him wrong. Now I am back doing what I love, and I have a beautiful family.

The Alabama Head and Spinal Cord Injury Registry (AHSCIR) requires hospital trauma TBI records be collected, reviewed, and eligible individuals contacted for needed linkage to crucial services and supports statewide. For FY22, 6,874 new records were received from the Alabama Department of Public Health and 3,435 individuals were eligible to be contacted to provide information and referral assistance from ADRS, AHIF and other community agencies.
